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ARBA APPLICATION TIPS

PURPOSE

Many of the National Youth Contests of the American Rabbit Breeders Association are application based. This information is presented in order for applicants to take best advantage of the application platform to express themselves and their project. This is not an all-inclusive list of tips, nor is it intended to be a list of requirements, though some of these tips are designed to help applicants understand the specific requirements necessary to create a fair and manageable contest.

BASIC FORMATTING CONVENTIONS

These tips are to help you navigate the requirements of proper formatting. These contests have both a word limit and a page limit. Readability is very important!

- 1 Font faces: The two most popular (and readable) fonts are *Times New Roman* and *Arial*. Using one of these will help make the application more readable.
- 2 Font size: Business standards, as well as these contests, use 10-point or 12-point type.
- 3 Page Margins: Margins should be between ½inch and 1½inches, with the most common size being 1 inch.
- 4 Style: The indiscriminate use and overuse of font styles (**bold**, *italic*, <u>underline</u>, etc.) serves to diminish your writing. Some use can be helpful, but be careful only to use it when necessary.
- 5 Questions: Make sure you copy the question above your answer. It reminds the scorers of what you have been asked.

OTHER TIPS FOR A GOOD APPLICATION

- 6 If you are submitting your applications by mail, do not send your applications in report covers or on paper that will not scan well. All applications are scored online, even those submitted by postal mail.
- 7 Make sure you answer the question asked! You can talk about other things as well, but the most common error is not answering the questions asked.
- 8 Pay attention to deadlines. Late applications will sabotage your effort.
- 9 Be clear and concise. Answer the question fully, but do not rely on an unnecessary volume of words to make the point that you want to make just to fill up space for an answer to one of the questions you have been asked, like this tip is doing! Don't use two lines if only one is needed.
- 10 Using good grammar and spelling tells the judge you are serious and careful. Ask a teacher or other adult to help you proofread your application.
- 11 Pictures tell a lot about you and your project. Select them carefully and size them appropriately to tell the story. Include captions so the judges know what they are looking at and why. However, not all answers will lend themselves to being helped by a picture. Concise use of pictures can be just as important as concise use of language.
- 12 Occasionally, the order of questions will change from year to year. Make sure you use the current year's questions. It is always helpful to start with your application from last year, but make sure you properly edit for the current year.
- 13 Put your name and contest on EVERY PAGE of your application.
- 14 Honesty is, as always, the best policy. Be mindful of the fact that scorers, while remaining anonymous, may be able to verify the claims made in your application. You do not want to get caught embellishing your activities or accomplishments.

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ARBA 2016 NATIONAL YOUTH INDIVIDUAL CONTESTS

PURPOSE

To acknowledge excellence among ARBA youth members in attendance at the ARBA National Convention and Show through the evaluation of their knowledge and skills involved in the rabbit and cavy industry.

RULES

- 1 Any ARBA youth member is eligible to compete, however, attendance at the National Convention is required.
- 2 A contestant may enter as many contests that are age-appropriate as they wish.
- 3 The age of a contestant is determined as of the last day of the national convention.
- 4 All contestants must check in, either personally or by an adult representative, by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 8, 2016. Contestants will be given approximate times for their contest participation at check-in.

CONTESTS AND DIVISIONS

National Breed Identification Contest

- 1 Divisions: Junior(Ages 5 to 11 years), Intermediate(Ages 12 to 14 years), and Senior(Ages 15 -18 years).
- 2 Contestants will identify 25 animals, both rabbits and cavies, listing the complete breed name as printed in the *ARBA Standard of Perfection*, the showroom variety, whether a 4-class or 6-class breed, and the registration variety of each of the 25 animals.
- 3 No abbreviations are accepted.

National Skill-a-Thon Contest

- 1 Division: Pre-Junior(Ages 5 to 8 years).
- 2 Preregistration is encouraged, but not required for this contest.
- 3 Contestants will participate in various knowledge and skills stations.

National Showmanship Contest

- 1 Division: Junior(Ages 9 to 11 years).
- 2 Contestants will examine and evaluate an animal telling what and why as they go along.
- 3 A contestant may use their own animal or the committee will have some available the first round.
- 4 Call backs will be made for at least the top five at each table. Call backs will be posted by noon Sunday.

National Judging Contest

- 1 Divisions: Intermediate(Ages 12 to 14 years), and Senior(Ages 15 -18 years).
- 2 Each team member will be required to place four classes of four animals per class. This is a timed event of 7 minutes per class. The use of the ARBA Standard of Perfection at the judging table is encouraged.
- 3 Judging classes may involve rabbits (including meat classes), cavies, fur and wool.
- 4 Call backs will be made for at least the top five at each table. Call backs will be posted by noon Sunday. New for 2016... Those contestants who receive a judging call back will be required to give oral reasons on one class of the call back judging animals. Scores will not be counted as part of the total judging or royalty score for this portion of the contest in 2016. Scores will be counted as part of the contest in 2017. More information will be made available as it is finalized. Please see the ARBA Youth Committee notes page (https://www.arba.net/arbayouth/) for updates.

ENTRY PROCEDURES

Entry must be made **online** or on the form provided by the ARBA Youth Department. This form is available from your ARBA District Director, the ARBA office, the ARBA Youth Website, and the ARBA Youth Committee. **NO EMAIL ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.**

All online entries must be completed by 11:59:59 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time on September 1, 2016. Mailed entries must be postmarked by August 18, 2016 and should be mailed to the ARBA Youth Chairperson.





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Rabbit and Cavy Showmanship

About Showmanship

Showmanship is an important skill that can be used to teach youth about their animals and the judging process. The ARBA method for judging rabbits and cavies is "judge based" not "handler based", as it is for most other animal species. The ARBA judge poses and handles the exhibition animals. The judge is charged with giving the animal an opportunity to be its best. The ARBA Showmanship Standard and contests are designed to teach and demonstrate the participant's ability to properly handle, pose and exhibit their animal. In today's climate, all animal organizations must be mindful of public perception and proper handling and care are an important consideration. It also benefits the youth and other breeders since youth who run through showmanship with their animals before a show, should find most DQ's before they reach the show table.

When to hold showmanship contests

The ARBA will be holding showmanship contests at the national convention, starting with the younger youth in 2011. We encourage state and local clubs to adopt the standard and hold local contests frequently so that youth are given a year round opportunity to learn these skills and prepare for the national contests. Many clubs have found that holding showmanship contests with their regular shows draws more youth to the show and causes them to be more involved. It also helps build the skills and knowledge that we need in our next generation of judges.

Judging showmanship

The score sheets were developed to evaluate the manual skills in transporting, handling, and properly posing the animal; and to evaluate the use of proper terminology and knowledge necessary for judging the animal. Showmanship judges should be mindful that they are judging the contestant and not the animal. Showmanship contests should always be a learning experience, so judges should provide written comments to the contestants, which clearly show what they need to practice or learn to improve.

Study Materials

ARBA has many publications that can help the contestant gain the knowledge they need to be both successful breeders and contestants. Breed clubs and 4-H also have publications which can be quite useful. Some of the ARBA publications are:

<u>Standard of Perfection 2011-2016</u>: Must have- This is the standard by which all rabbits and cavies are judged and includes show rules and proper terminology.

<u>Raising Better Rabbits and Cavies</u>: A compendium of articles with in-depth discussions of many important topics.

<u>Registrar's Study Guide to Rabbits</u>, <u>Registrar's Study Guide to Cavies</u>: Companion guides to the Standard of Perfection with the information organized uniformly, comparisons of characteristics between breeds and hundreds of sample questions. They include detailed information on writing registration varieties and how to become a registrar or judge.

Breed ID Study Guide: A 5-page excerpt from the Standard of Perfection that discusses Breed identification and writing a registration variety on a pedigree.

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ARBA 2016 NATIONAL TEAM BREED IDENTIFICATION CONTEST

PURPOSE

To acknowledge outstanding group critical thinking skills, demonstrate group initiative and provide problem solving and decision making activities in a small group. This is provided through a state represented team identification competition of ARBA recognized breeds at the ARBA National Convention.

ELIGIBILITY

Each state may submit, through their ARBA District Director, as many teams per age division as they wish. Age divisions will be: 5-11 years; 12-14 years; and 15-18 years. The age of a team member is determined as of the last day of the national convention. A team must consist of four members and may have two alternates named. A team must have four members present at the ARBA National Convention. All team members must be ARBA Youth members and current members of an ARBA chartered club in the state they are representing. All team members participating on a state team must be residents of said state. *Contestants not already entered in an individual contest must submit an Entry & Publicity Release Form with this form.*

Your ARBA District Director has the option of submitting a team in each age division consisting of members from within their district. Participants residing in a state without enough participants to form a state team are eligible to participate on a district team. Each district is permitted one district team in each age division.

RULES

- 1 Teams consist of four to six members. Selection of the four members who's scores will determine the team score will be made by the Team Coordinator at check-in.
- 2 There is no limit to the number of four to six member teams that may be formed from each state in each age division.
- 3 Team members must participate in their true age group **and may only be a member on one team**.
- 4 All team members must report to the Breed Identification area as a group and go through the contest at the same time.

CONTEST PROCEDURES

- 1 Team members must check into the contest area together. The team will be placed in a supervised area until ALL members of the team have completed the contest. If a team member leaves the contest area without official supervision, they will not be allowed to return to the area and the team will be withdrawn from the competition.
- 2 Each team member will be required to identify 25 animals, both rabbits and cavies, listing the complete breed name as printed in the ARBA Standard of Perfection. They will also identify the showroom variety/classification, whether a 4 class or 6 class breed, and the registration variety of each of the 25 animals. A separate question or animal will act as a tie-breaker. No abbreviations are accepted.
- 3 Team score will be the sum of the four individual member scores on the team. In the event of a tie, the team's tie-breaker scores will be added to the total score.
- 4 Winners will be announced and awards presented at the ARBA Youth Banquet at the National Convention.

ENTRY PROCEDURES

Application must be made on the form provided by the ARBA Youth Department. This form is available from your ARBA District Director, the ARBA office, the ARBA Youth Website, and the ARBA Youth Committee. State organizations are required to inform their ARBA District Director by September 1, 2016 of their intent to participate in this contest. The number of teams from each state must be declared at this time.

Application must be postmarked by September 15, 2016 and should be mailed to your District Director.

• Proof of membership in an ARBA chartered club within the state being represented must be included with the application for each team member and alternate. This can be a copy of a membership card showing the expiration date or a letter from a club secretary verifying membership.








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





















What am I?



How to write registration varieties

In writing a registration variety on a pedigree, it is important to first consider why a registration variety is listed. There are two reasons:

- 1. The pedigree is primarily used for breeding. Thus the information on it should be in adequate detail give an idea of the genetics of the animal. Animals in the pedigree background should be identified even if they are not a recognized color (Himalayan- Chocolate, Dalmatian -Golden Solid, etc)
- 2. A secondary reason is so as to be able to identify the animal. Many species require a photograph or drawing of any markings. Cavy and rabbit pedigrees only use the variety for identification.

Writing the variety-

The ARBA directs how a variety should be listed. It is stated: *Fill in the "variety" with the exact color. Do not list groups.*

There are some significant differences between rabbits and cavies. Rabbits must have white in order to be "broken" so a white and blue rabbit would be listed as "broken blue". Cavies however, do not require white, any 2 or more colors can be a broken color. Thus it is important to list all colors, including white to properly describe the cavy. Note: there is no broken color: red, black as that is a tortoise shell and a broken color: red, black, white is a tortoise shell and white.

Listing the colors in order of amount present on a cavy gives more detailed information as to the appearance.

The variety roan is an intermixing of white and any color. In order to understand the underlying genetics, it is important to list the colors present such as roan: black.

The variety dilute is composed of two colors on the hair shaft. In order to understand the underlying genetics, it is important to list the colors present such as dilute solid: chocolate, cream. There is a color chart on page 222 of the standard of perfection listing acceptable combinations.

Some examples of how to write a registration variety

Self cavies: list the actual variety

Beige	Lilac
Black	Red Eyed Orange
Chocolate	Red
Cream	White

ARBA Breed ID Guidelines & Rules

<u>General</u>

- Contestants will be asked to identify the Breed, Showroom Variety, Registration Variety and Four/Six Class status of twenty-five (25) animals. Ideally, twenty (20) of these animals will be rabbit and five (5) will be cavies.
- All animals in the Breed ID will be over 6 months of age.
- There will be no duplicate breeds in each contest area.
- Only the answers listed in the ARBA Official Breed ID Guide will be accepted.
- At no time will contestants be allowed to have the ARBA Standard of Perfection or any notes with them in the ID area.
- There will be no talking in the Breed ID area. Anyone found talking will have their answer sheets taken from them, will be asked to leave the Breed ID area and will receive a score of zero (0). If the contestant has a question, they may raise their hand and the monitor will assist them.
- Once a contestant has started Breed ID, they are not allowed to leave the Breed ID area.
- All members of a State or District team must go thought the Breed ID at the same time.
- Each age group will be assigned a series of tie breaker questions that they are to answer.

Scoring

- Answer sheets will be scored from left to right. <u>Once an incorrect answer has been reached, no further credit will be given for that row.</u> Example, the contestant correctly identifies the animal as a Satin, but incorrectly identifies its showroom variety. The contestant will receive no further credit for the registration variety or the four/six class.
- There are twenty-five (25) rows on the score sheet and four (4) columns, totaling one hundred (100) spaces for the contestants to fill in. Each of these spaces is worth two (2) points, for a total of two hundred (200) points possible for the Breed ID contest.
- Abbreviations are not allowed and will be counted as incorrect.
- Misspelled answers will not be counted down as long as the scorers can understand what the contestant means.
- Answers must be listed exactly as listed on the ARBA Official Breed ID Guide to be counted as correct (i.e. a Holland Lop would be listed as a Broken Pattern, the word "Cavy" should <u>not</u> be listed after the name of the cavy breeds).
- Answer sheets will be added by two different people to try and insure accuracy in scoring.
- In the event of a tie, the tie breaker questions will be used to determine the winner. This is the only time that the tie breaker will be considered in the Breed ID score.

Pre-Convention:

- 12 How many litters with how many total animals did you have born Since January 1, 2014? How many young did you wean?
- 13 Do you track the quality of your offspring to the breeding animals? Explain.
- 14 Describe your culling procedure. What do you do with your surplus animals?
- 15 How many replacement animals have you added since January 1, 2014? What qualities do you look for in selecting replacements?
- 16 Describe any diseases that have affected your production and explain what you did to control them.
- 17 Explain your system for keeping records and what information is kept on each animal.
- 18 Did your ARBA animal project show a profit or loss last year? Explain.



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ARBA 2016 NATIONAL YOUTH EDUCATIONAL CONTESTS

PURPOSE

To acknowledge excellence among ARBA youth members who create exhibits that show some aspect of the rabbit or cavy industry. These exhibits must be placed on view at the annual ARBA National Convention.

RULES

- 1 Any ARBA youth member is eligible to compete. Attendance at the National Convention is not necessary.
- 2 Exhibits must be informational or promotional of either rabbits or cavies, or include a rabbit or cavy as part of their design.
- 3 A contestant may enter as many classes as they choose, but may submit only one entry per class.
- 4 Each entry must be the work of the contestant and must have been completed in the 12 months prior to the ARBA National Convention. Whenever possible, label exhibits on the back or bottom with exhibitor name, state and district.
- 5 All articles must be displayed in the designated area at the National Convention.
- 6 All entries will receive ribbons (Blue=excellent, Red=very good, White=good). Top entries in each class will be reevaluated to determine the National winners. National winners will be announced at the Youth Banquet at the National Convention. Exhibitors need not be present to win.
- 7 If an exhibitor is unable to attend the National Convention, transportation of their entry to the convention site will be their responsibility. If necessary, exhibits may be shipped directly to the ARBA Convention site but only after contact with the ARBA Youth Department chairperson. [Because of the nature of large convention sites, special addressing and labeling along with specific delivery dates are required.]
- 8 Your name, address, age, and class entered should be clearly indicated on both the inside and outside of the entry and any packaging. Be sure your exhibit comes with instructions as to the disposition of your exhibit at the end of the Convention. An attempt will be made to return any unclaimed exhibits through your ARBA District Director. Otherwise unclaimed exhibits will be destroyed at the end of the convention.

DIVISIONS

Exhibitors will enter the class listed below, and based upon age, exhibit in one of three age divisions for EACH CLASS. For example, there will be three Art – Drawing classes (Junior, Intermediate, Senior) that will each have a Best of Class awarded. These three class winners, along with the three class winners EACH in Art – Painting and Art -Sculpture or Carving will compete for National Winner in the Art Group.

Framing, with or without glass, and /or an easel to display is optional.

Drawing Painting Sculpture or Carving

Crafts Division

Display to best suit the item and clearly and easily visible. Small items may be fastened to a display board or in a display box for protection..

Ceramics or Pottery Handmade Jewelry Clothing (made by exhibitor) Needlework Puppet or Stuffed Animal Stenciled Item Wearable Art Any Other Craft

Creative Writing Division

Exhibit in a protective report cover or clear plastic sleeve for protection. Exhibited at convention. Do not send to Youth Committee Chair prior to convention.
